The stump puller is finally erect again. Hope to get is set next year so that we can simulate how this device works.

The Housebarn interior has been "jacked up" by Chris Kuehnel a few inches, working towards 'realigning' the second and the third levels; as we work to replace and/or support the disintegrating (170 year old) interior sill timbers.

And a special thanks to Chris for making every work day this summer. Whether he had help or not, he was there ready to lead the projects!



GERMAN HERITAGE DAY 2019 REPORTED BY MARGARET LUTZE

In honor of the many families that immigrated to Wisconsin from Saxony and other states that eventually became Germany in the mid-late 1840s, Centreville Settlement, Inc. held a German Heritage Day. The event was held on August 10, 2019 at Lakeshore Technical College and the Lutze Housebarn.

Over 80 people attended the morning symposium that included four speakers. Dr. Richard Otto Wiegand gave a talk based on his new book titled "Excerpts from Centerville, an Historical Fiction", Dr. Merry Wiesner-Hanks spoke on "Germany to Wisconsin: Immigrant Families of the Nineteenth Century", Dr. Eric Yonke gave a talk on "German Lands in the Nineteenth Century—Patterns of Emigration", and Dr. James E. Schultz talked about "Methods for Researching Your Roots: The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly."

The hungry crowd was welcomed and serenaded by accordion master Ryan Kautzer and Centreville's own-Kathy Pearce on upright bass. A delicious German style catered lunch of sausages (head cheese, summer sausage, liverwurst), assorted cheeses, fresh veggies, sourdough pretzels, and various dark hearty breads along with traditional desserts were enjoyed.

The afternoon events at the Lutze Housebarn included a church service delivered in German as services were held in the 1800s-led by Rev. George Enderle, a presentation by John Barbeau on "The History of Sheepshead (Schafkopf)", a presentation by Dr. Richard Otto Wiegand titled, "Housebarn—A Brief History of S. Union Road" based on his upcoming book "Centerville". Tours of the Lutze Housebarn, German waltzes and polkas on accordion, spinning and weaving demonstrations, quilt and antique toy displays, a talk on genealogy by Dr. James E. Schultz and photo displays of Centerville families.

The goals of Centreville Settlement, Inc. are to preserve the historic and unique buildings that exist in the Centerville area and are in need of preservation, developing educational programming focused on ethnic arts and crafts, understanding German immigrant heritage and settler sufficiency skills, genealogy and local historical research, promoting and stimulating local economic development related to this immigrant history, recording an oral history of the Centerville families, insuring the serenity of the area that attracted the original settlers, and restoring the Lutze Housebarn. The German Heritage Day of August 2019 certainly met these goals and hopefully more German Heritage Days in the future will help to insure and expand the fulfillment of these goals

FUN AND FUND RAISING SUCCESS: On May 5 & 6th the Brat Fry Fund Raiser headed off to a strong start with Richard Lutze setting up and coordinating the efforts of the grill masters-including himself and Glenn Lutze. LUTZE HOUSEBARN BUILDING REPORT 2019

& SITE PROJECTS FOR 2020:

- Our one-of-a-kind outhouse roof is almost finished being re-shingled with hand split cedar shakes
- We finished a few more details on the stump puller, and raised it 'by hand' with our 'tree crane' in October!
- Progress was made on the stone foundation on the north side of the west addition



- <<< Over the winter we plan to be slowly raising the inner first floor walls and sills back to their original bearing height>>>>
- We look forward to enhanced interpretive displays on the second floor in 2020
- Two small timbers remain to be replaced in 2020, one in the addition, and
- one in the south 2nd floor 'chicken coop' wall
- Our chimney is in need of stabilization and/or weatherizing. For 2020 we look to covering it and providing attic ventilation through a 'spinner', want to help make that happen??
- Windows and doors continue to look for our attention in 2020, we are looking for a finish carpenter with an eye for detail to assist and lead in that area, are you the one?



We are always looking for folks of any age interested in learning 'the trades' of the 1800's in the upcoming year, come join us for one day or a season! INTERNATIONAL VISITORS TO THE LUTZE HOUSEBARN

CSI member Peter Lutze stopped at the Lutze Housebarn last spring with his wife, Cui Jie, and her parents from China. Peter and Cui Jie live in Chicago and her parents are from Guzhen in AnHui province. They were on a tour of Wisconsin and when they stopped at the Housebarn they were lucky enough to have Greg Zahn working there so they could be given a tour. They were impressed with the effort to preserve such an historic structure and the interest the local families have in exploring their ancestry and family culture. Greg mentions they spoke of a similar style of now historic half timber structures being built in China!





WHAT IS IT? This is a "One Man Grain Bagger" After harvest the stored grain was often hauled to the mill by wagon load in burlap bags. It took two people to bag the grain—a shoveler and a bag holder. If you did not have one of these baggers you or someone else would be left "holding the bag". This artifact (and many others) were donated in December 2016 by John and Diane Schuchardt now of Elkhorn WI. It is shown here in the Housebarn granary area on workday, November 10, 2018.

Along with the original donation of the Lutze Housebarn to CSI we received hundreds of artifacts, tools, and early farm implements. Since then we have received hundreds more artifacts of all types from members and friends. The majority of our collection has been cataloged and we hope to soon make that collection more available to the public via the internet with photos and details for scholars, members, and students.
