Life Size Narren Visit Housebarn!

Board members of Centreville Settlement (CSI) were surprised by the appearance of Narren. Arrangements of their visit were made by Kathy Sixel, a charter member of the Greater Centerville Historians. Rosa, Hattie, Louis, and Tittle (pictured above) are members of the Narren of New Ulm in Minnesota.

The Narren are often referred to as "The relatives everybody has, but no one wants to claim" and consist of 28 characters, 3 cats, a cow, and a goat. Inspiration for the group came from the centuries old German custom of masking during the season between Epiphany and Lent. They are easily recognized by their hand carved wooden masks, colorful costumes, and jingling bells. The Narren have appeared at various events throughout MN, WI, SD and Germany, providing fun and good humor for people of all ages.

Continued from Page $1 \sim$ Over the last winter, Niles researched the plants and seeds that were used by the German immigrants

of the late 1800's. A book he referenced was <u>Putting Down</u>
<u>Roots</u> by Ms.
Carmichael. He took great care in ordering heirloom and vintage varieties of vegetable and flower seeds and plants.



Following the 1870's German garden from Old World Wisconsin, Niles planted the garden in the straight row style used by German settlers at that time.

Other recent additions doing well in the garden are the Mortgage Lifter heirloom tomato and the rhubarb received from Pearce Farms in Walworth County. Mortgage Lifter is from the 1930's and is a robust, prolific tomato which helped many families keep their properties during the hard times of the era. The rhubarb genetics date back over 100+ years.

Needless to say, the German Heritage Garden has been successful. The potatoes, kale, rutabaga, beets, and cabbage did the best in 2015. Work is being done to expand the garden to a size of 15' x



30'. A fence will be the next phase that will bring the garden closer to the 1870's style. The fence will be made of willow and will help with pest control. Barb and Niles are commended for their attention to detail in selecting heirloom varieties as well as their work to gain authentic knowledge for the historic garden expansion.

Archivist Shares Progress

Nathan Chisholm is the Centreville Settlement, Inc. Archivist. The archiving project continues at the Lutze Housebarn, as a result of Nathan's efforts of securing a grant from West Foundation in October 2014.

The clothing and textiles have been documented and properly prepared for permanent storage in the collection. Over the coming winter, Centreville Settlement needs to temporarily house these fragile items from the damp and cold conditions of the Housebarn until a permanent housing solution can be found. If anyone has a dry, conditioned space they would be willing to lend out through the winter, please contact Kathy Sixel at 920-693-8525.

Since the last update, the Lutze Housebarn hosted an Open House event on June 27th. In the weeks leading up to the event, the Housebarn underwent a top-



to-bottom cleaning and reorganization. Nathan was able to go through the part of the collection that is currently on display and archive all the artifacts in that display.

The reorganization has allowed us to display some new objects that have been added to the collection recently, such as a period peg bed (1880-1890), a beautiful set of Victorian Eastlake parlor furniture, and a spinning wheel. Recently accepted items include a small logging bobsled and treadle powered Singer sewing machine.

Over 200 accessions have been cataloged; the actual number of objects is much greater as some accessions have multiple objects. See the column at left for a listing of items archived in the recent months. If you want to help with archiving, please contact Nathan at 920-946-8897.
